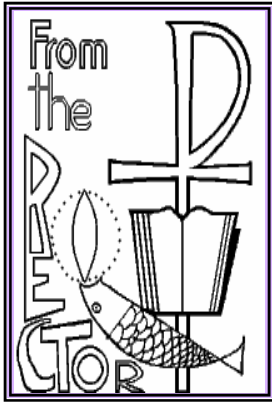

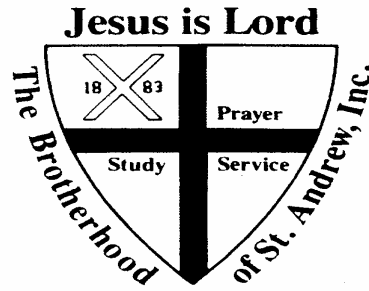

OUR ANGLICAN HERITAGE “All Hail The Lord Protector!”

After the execution of King Charles (BCP: January 30, 1649), a great unease settled over the country as one might expect. The head that was removed from Charles was also “the head of State,” as well as a unifying symbol of the nation. Without the institutions which had been counted on for so many generations to add at least a veneer of stability (i.e. the monarchy and national Church), England entered into a period of societal and governmental uncertainty never before experienced.

As is so often the case when a nation loses its leader, the real and imagined needs for order, stability and a return to something approaching normalcy prevailed: several years after going without a head of state at all, Parliament was summarily removed from power by the army and its leader, Oliver Cromwell, was declared “Lord Protector” of England in December, 1653. Cromwell would remain in this post until his death five years later.

Cromwell had distinguished himself in battle during the Civil War (particularly at the seminal *Battle of Naseby*, where he led a last-ditch cavalry charge which won the day for the Puritan cause), and more recently by subjugating both Scotland and Ireland (some say the Irish campaign was more of a genocidal nature). Having proved his mettle in these military endeavors, it seemed natural to turn to his heavy hand to restore order in the (now) *Commonwealth-soon-to-be-Protectorate* of England. He was strongly anti-Anglican, of course, and with the old established church in disarray -- and much of its clerical leadership in exile with the Stuart royal family in France -- things looked bleak for Anglicanism altogether.

Without central church doctrine or leadership (remember that *congregationalism* was the watchword), many new sects (we’d call them cults) arose. The *Baptist church* entered seriously into England for the first time, and the *Quakers* and the *Levellers* and the *Ranters* (say, don’t we still have some of them??) and many more arose, too. *Presbyterianism* was the guiding religious persuasion of the day, overall, and did provide a more traditional religious expression than most of the other upstarts. Most of all, missing were any semblance of church leadership or ecumenical cooperation (to say the least!).

Yet followers of the deposed (and martyred) Archbishop Laud (*Laudians*) set themselves up as an informal “church-in-exile” and prepared for the hoped-for day when the monarchy would be restored and with it the “real Anglican Catholic faith”.

Their long-awaited turn came swiftly: in 1658, Cromwell died and his son, Richard, was appointed to succeed him. “Hadn’t England done away with an hereditary monarchy,” many asked? Did it really need to begin a new one? The answer was, “No!” and in 1660, Richard was forced to resign while a carefully-orchestrated process began, aimed at restoring the Stuart monarchy to England after its eleven-year absence.

With *The Restoration* would come a new and revitalized Church of England.

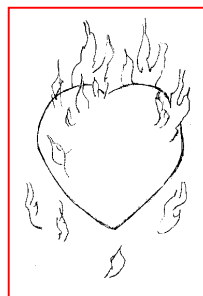

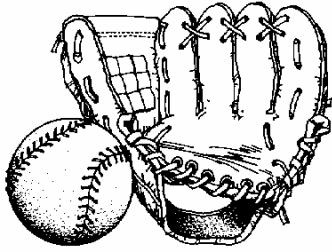
- ❖ Prayers for Mary Jones, who is at Bradley Bay and recovering from heart surgery.

Good Afternoon Pastors and Church Staff Members,

The city of Strongsville is proud to announce that we will be offering two different softball leagues later this summer exclusively for teams comprised of members of their own church congregation.



The first league to mention is the Church Family League. The Family League is new to Strongsville and a new concept in general to the world of softball leagues. One of our concerns within the recreation department is that there are not enough programs structured for the entire family. So to help bring families closer we are trying to offer this new league. The league is non-competitive in nature. It is formatted to be gendered co-ed and open to anyone who is 12 years of age and above. Some of you may have concerns for the safety of a 12 year old when playing with grown men or women. But we have implemented several rules that protect the safety of the children (such as a reduced injury factor ball).

The second league to mention is the Men's 18 years and older league. This league has been running for several years and has become increasingly popular. Last summer we had 14 different teams from local churches in the surrounding communities. If all previous teams return there are just two spots remaining for new teams to enter. 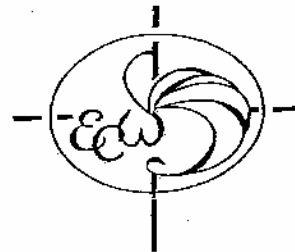

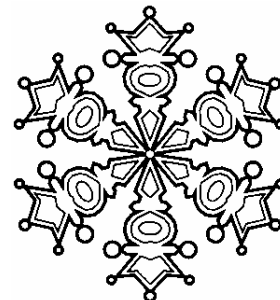
Episcopal Church Women

10 Ways to Support Someone with Cancer:
(#1 at St. Thomas: pray.)

- ❖ Recognize their pain: When struggling with an illness, sometimes it would be nice to hear something besides "Isn't it a nice day?"
- ❖ Look around and see what needs to be done.
- ❖ Make a meal and drop it off. Don't stay to visit unless you are specifically invited in. Do just as the name implies. *Drop it off.* Then leave.
- ❖ Send your friend a card (handwritten and mailed).
- ❖ Call first. Never just "drop in".
- ❖ Combine errands. You are going to the grocery store anyway. Why not call and ask to pick something up or drop something off?
- ❖ Avoid the temptation to become the self-appointed medical expert. Be the shoulder to lean on and do not try to take the place of a doctor.
- ❖ Offer transportation to doctors' appointments and treatment centers. This is a huge burden that can be lifted. Your friend will appreciate the company, and it will relieve some stress from a family member who may need to keep taking time off from work.
- ❖ Don't forget the caregiver. Provide relief by offering your services or giving a gift certificate to a restaurant.
- ❖ Donate your vacation or sick time.
