FROM THE WARDEN'S DEN...

Living out the Gospel of Christ in a troubled world

The past several Sundays, Rev. Gayle has preached on the responsibility of Christians to be tolerant, loving individuals in their daily lives. This is a very timely message, as we have been bombarded with many negative – and sometimes hateful and prejudiced -- comments during this super-heated 2008 presidential election campaign.

I, myself, was subjected to a diatribe from a hate-filled person just the other day as I sat in my car at a stoplight in Strongsville. A man pulled up next to me, and seeing the Obama bumper sticker on my car, rolled down his window and spewed out a string of obscenities at me for being a "N*****-lover."

Mindful of Gayle's admonition to refrain from in-kind responses to such provocations, I just smiled at the man and drove off without saying a word. The anger and hatred that man feels are certainly punishment enough for him; I need not have added my personal condemnation.

The principal role -- really the only role -- of the Christian Church is to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ in the World and to live out the tenets of that Gospel in our daily lives (as best we can as fallible human beings). The *role of the clergy* of our church is to take the message of the Gospel of Christ and help interpret it for us, giving us thought-provoking ideas on how to fulfill our Christian responsibilities.

Rev. Gayle has done this in her sermon the past several weeks, somewhat, I gather, to the dismay of a few in our pews. So as Senior Warden, I must remind you that she is doing *exactly* what she is charged with doing and nothing more. If you personally feel offended at what she has had to say about this hateful political season, then perhaps her comments were well-directed towards you.

The heart of Jesus' Gospel message is that we must give unconditional love and understanding to others. He specifically warned against giving that love and understanding just to those with whom we agree. As you all know, he said that *"It's easy to love your friends, but I tell you to love your enemies."*

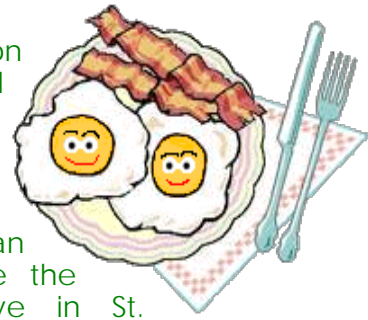
Not only did Jesus talk the talk, but he walked the walk to the bitter end by dying to demonstrate this message. So, before you get hot under the collar about what Rev. 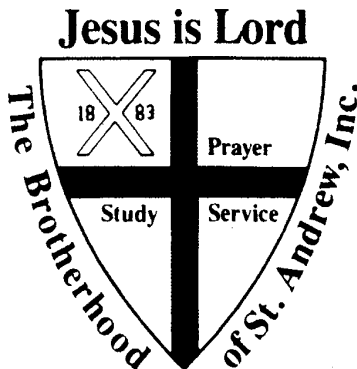

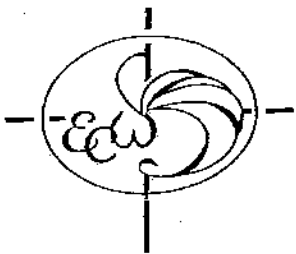

γ Congratulations to all the talented thespians who put on such a great show of our ministries! The STARS are expecting a call from Broadway any minute now!

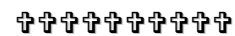
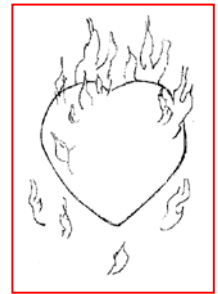

When to get a Second Opinion from a Doctor

In some medical instances, it really helps to get a second opinion. Simply knowing your options and thinking through the pros and cons can improve your care. When asking for that second opinion, most experts would advise that your first physician is aware. Most physicians say that it is important to know the basis of that first doctor’s opinion. When making your final decision, the thing to consider is what you’re trying to achieve. In life-and-death situations, some people want to live longer and some want to live better, which is a very personal decision. In less serious cases, it can be a matter of weighing your current discomfort level against the risks involved with the available treatment options. The best choice is the one that helps you reach more of your goals while allowing you to accept living with the good and bad consequences. A good doctor won’t be insulted when asked to recommend a second opinion. A suggestion for you to say might be “This is a difficult decision for me and I’d like to learn about other treatments than the one we discussed. Can you recommend someone I could talk to?” Don’t say any version of “I don’t trust your judgment. I don’t like you. I’m not sure if you’re a good doctor.” Comments like these would put anyone on the defensive. When to get that second opinion is:

- if your doctor suggests surgery
- if you are prescribed long-term use of medications with side effects (ask about non-drug-related options) or
- if you’re not getting better. When you need a second opinion, here’s what you’ll want to look for:
- a doctor affiliated with a hospital other than your original one
- a staff member at a big research and teaching hospital
- a physician who is more experienced with your problem than the first doctor.

“Going for the Green”



Even though the price of gas has dipped back down, it is still wise to consider how you use your car. In order to protect your pocketbook and help the Earth at the same time, NOW is a great time to start making use of public transportation. You don't have to commit to taking a bus or rapid to work every day, but give it a try maybe twice a month. If you find it suits you, you can increase how often you ride. You can also consider carpooling or ride-sharing. There are many online resources that can help match you up with other people (if you don't already know with whom to ride). If you have the advantage of being close enough to your destination, walk or ride a bike occasionally. And remember to combine car trips (errands) as much as possible. Making these changes now, while gas costs are down slightly and the weather isn't too bad yet, gives you a leg up. You'll have experience and a feel for what works best for you and you'll avoid some of the mad scramble that is sure to happen when gasoline costs increase again.

from YOUR TREASURER

Welcome to the first column in the *Wayfarer* by your Treasurer Tom Halliday. I am so blessed to offer my God given skills to St. Thomas as your Treasurer. Dollar\$ and \$en\$e will appear in the *Wayfarer* in the month immediately following the close of each quarter. You will see a Condensed Income Statement and a Balance Sheet

REVENUE

The first 9 months of 2008 show a loss of \$14,897.86 compared to a loss of \$20,596.60 in 2007. Pledge income in 2008 is \$112,725.98 compared to \$131,572.02 in 2007 or a reduction of \$18,846.04, or 14.3%. Expenses in 2008 are \$179,990.54 compared to \$175,775.29 in 2007 or an increase of \$4,215.25, or 2.4%.

EXPENSE

The loss of \$14,897.86 is smaller than 2007 but unfortunately all of the loss has come in the last four months. The church is now averaging \$4,000 a month loss starting in June. We were showing a profit at the end of May. The price of gasoline reached \$4.00 a gallon and our pledge income dropped.

HARKESS INCOME

Harkess income is \$38,467.10 in 2008 compared to \$13,785.48 in 2007. This \$24,681.62 increase is the result of your vestry in

the fall of 2007 moving \$500,000 of investments from stocks to bonds to increase our annual income. The church should receive in October approximately \$28,000 from the Harkess Trust after the church pays back loans and advances of \$61,000.

MEETING 9-28-2008

I want to clarify my statement at our 9-28 meeting. The church is not out of cash and hopefully the actions by your vestry will prevent the church from ever being out of cash. The vestry has allocated \$9,500, as budgeted in 2008, from the Harkess payment to be used for growth oriented activities and purchases.

OUR ANGLICAN HERITAGE

Poems, Prayers and Promises

When the *you-know-what* hits the fan, things can get messy

You heard it from me...in 1685, Charles II died and his younger brother, James, ascended the throne of England. Where Charles had been something of a reconciler (as the times of his reign clearly demanded), James practiced far less constraint when it came to religious matters.

Many in the realm had long feared the day when James would take over. Charles (you may remember) had snookered his subjects by converting to Roman Catholicism on his deathbed (as he had long been rumored to have planned). And now his brother came to power a *devout and unrepentant Romanist* himself.

James got off to a bad start: the coronation ceremony had to be altered since James refused to receive Anglican Communion. Not a trust-building move. He then tried to calm his countrymen by promising to allow the established Anglican Church to remain substantially unchanged, but most were understandably dubious of his sincerity. It didn't help when he *introduced Catholic scholars to Cambridge and Oxford*, nor when he *established several convents in London*, something not allowed since Henry VIII dissolved them over a century before. James further stated that he would not enforce the "Test Act" passed by Parliament during his brother's reign which demanded allegiance to the Anglican Church of all governmental leaders. Clearly, "Popeism" was on the rise, and the protestants (who overwhelmingly controlled the country) were not about to let it happen without one heck of a fight.

Trying to quell the growing unrest, James issued *Declarations of Indulgence* in 1687, declaring his protection for the Anglican Church but also suspending penal laws against nonconformists (Puritans and Presbyterians) as well as Roman Catholics. Several Anglican bishops refused to comply with the *Declarations* and were arrested, thrown in the Tower of London and tried. However, they were acquitted and immediately set free, and at that point, James must have known he was in *deep doo-doo* (see title of essay above).

A few days after the acquittal, James' wife gave birth to a son – and, of course, Catholic heir to the throne. The Protestants had had enough: in mid-1688, overtures were secretly made by Parliament to the Dutch protestant *William of Orange* -- who was (conveniently) married to James' daughter from his first marriage, *Mary* -- to come to England to assume the throne and reign as husband and wife.

William gathered an invasion force and landed in England on (of all days) November 5th (Guy Fawke's Day). In December, James fled England for France and William entered London to take the throne.

The last great chapter in the violent politics of *Stuart England* was about to begin.
